Location: Millbrook, New York

Embodying the practices of social, financial, and environmental sustainability all in one project, the Millbrook Library provides a refrigerator for community members to exchange goods: reducing food waste and enabling access to free meals.

Working with support from local businesses and community donations, the fridge and adjacent pantry shelves are stocked with a rotating variety of goods to aid individuals and families that may struggle with food insecurity, need a home cooked meal for the soul, or have grown more in their gardens than they know what to do with.



Food is provided for those in

Every person has the right to basic healthy food – fruits, vegetables, seed, nuts, and grains – for free. No one should ever go hungry.

The community grows stronger!

Community fridges are an example of what is called "mutual aid," a term that simply means people voluntarily help each other and share resources.

We prevent food waste.

Wasting food wastes the water and energy it took to produce it, and generates greenhouse gases Food that sits in landfills also produces nitrogen pollution.

We Accept:

- · Fruits and vegetables.
- · Water, juice, and non-alcoholic drinks.
- · Ready-to-eat meals—many people need food that can be eaten as-is.
- Single-serve containers (preferably microwave-safe) / mason jars.
- · Bread and baked goods.
- · Commercially packaged meals
- · Dairy and dairy alternatives.
- · Plant-based meat alternatives.
- · Home-Cooked Meals (labeled)

All ingredients and allergens must be labeled.

All items must be labeled with an expiration date.

No opened or partially eaten items.

No medicines.

No alcohol or illicit substances.



Please do not donate food that you wouldn't want to eat yourself. The community fridge is for anyone who needs it

"The Millbrook Library, in collaboration with the Millbrook Rotary Club, launched an exciting initiative to support the community: a Community Fridge. Located at the library, the fridge is designed to reduce food waste while providing free access to food for those in need,

The concept is simple: community members can donate fresh produce, unopened pantry staples, and other food items, while others are welcome to take what they need—no questions asked. This project reflects a shared commitment to sustainability and mutual care within the Millbrook community."

The Suffolk Cooperative Library System (SCLS) in Bellport, New York was awarded with the Joseph F. Schubert Library Excellence Award at 2024's New York Library Association Annual Conference in November for their support of the Sustainable Libraries Initiative (SLI).

Given annually, the award recognizes the achievements of New York State libraries and library consortia of any size that have taken strides to improve the quality of library service in the last two years.

SCLS, designated in 2023 as the second library system to achieve certification through the Sustainable Library Certification Program, has supported the SLI for several years through the provision of office space, staff support, and financial assistance.

The generosity and contributions of the system have allowed the SLI to grow substantially. This support furthers the understanding of social, financial, and environmental sustainability for libraries across the globe and inspires library leaders to take action in pursuing a sustainable future for their communities.

The award is sponsored by the New York State Regents Advisory Council and is accompanied by a gift of \$1,000 supplied by the Friends of the New York State Library.

Interested in improving your grounds or gardens, growing food, or learning about ecology and design? Join us for this casual and informative talk led by Karen Tuininga, who will provide an introduction and overview of permaculture principles and history, techniques for applying permaculture approaches to your daily life, and a discussion of using permaculture in your gardens and landscapes.

Permaculture is a practical and creative design system that you can apply to everything from your garden to your calendar. Based on age-old common-sense holistic approaches (think catching rainwater off the roof for later use), permaculture emphasizes multiple production benefits with minimal energy use or waste. The result is resource use which is sustainable, resilient and responsible ... characteristics much needed in today's world. These design principles work at any scale small or large, in home or commercial gardens, and in every facet of our lives and organizations.

Grant Opportunity: Climate Smart Communities Initiative

This grants program is focused on assisting communities on the front lines of the climate crisis in the United States. As detailed in the selection criteria, the community must be facing significant climate-related challenges, based on environmental as well as socioeconomic considerations. If the proposed work is local in scope, the population of the community should be less than 300,000 residents. If the proposed work is regional in scope, areas with up to 500,000 residents will be considered. The initiative will accept applications into March of 2025, and expects to announce the awards in the summer of 2025.
