San Diego State University is part of a consortium of public and academic libraries in San Diego County called *Circuit* that began to support interlibrary lending, and was developed to include community-wide programming. Some of the programming in the last year, supported by a collaborative *All of Us* Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM) grant, focused on sustainability, environmental resilience, and climate justice.

At SDSU, sustainability librarian and SLCP program lead Sarah Tribelhorn shares that the library collaborated with their campus student sustainability organization, *Associated Students Green Love*, during Mending Minds Week focusing on the connection between climate resilience and mental health. The students selected the author, Chris Turner, to discuss his book "How to be a Climate Optimist", offering a message of hope and resilience in the face of climate change.



Following the author talk, the library hosted book discussions with students, fostering meaningful conversations about climate change and its impact. Student feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with one participant sharing

"This helped me to be more optimistic about issues that our generation is facing regarding the climate, and I appreciate the library organizing the event."

To ensure broad accessibility, all events were advertised countywide in both English and Spanish and subsequently recorded and made publicly available.

The new program guides school librarians through 5 sections designed to help integrate sustainable practices related to the triple bottom line of sustainability into the library curriculum: environmental stewardship, social equity, and economic feasibility.

“Collaborating with librarians across state lines has been rewarding, we're not just sharing resources - we're cultivating sustainable practices that will enrich libraries and communities for generations to come. Together, we're writing a new chapter in library stewardship.” says Ann-Marie Kalin, an SLCP certified school librarian and mentor to the first out-of-state participants.

Currently, 52 school librarians are active participants of the Sustainable Library Certification Program with an additional 14 school librarians having already achieved certification status.

School librarians have 12-months to complete the requirements and are provided with the assistance of a mentor. Mentors serve as a valuable resource throughout the process to help with pacing, review work, and provide advice where needed.

Read the New Publication by SLI President Rebekkah Smith Aldrich

Alongside Monika Antonelli, Minnesota State University; René Tanner, Rollins College; and Adrian K. Ho, University of Chicago; SLI President and Executive Director of the Mid-Hudson Library System Rebekkah Smith Aldrich published "The Storm is Here: Public Libraries' Role in Disaster Preparedness and Community Recovery" in the 51st issue of *Electronic Green Journal* this past month.

Building upon three years of research, the publication focuses on the role of public libraries in community support following weather disasters.

"A national survey of public library directors and administrators was conducted in 2022 to assess the role of public libraries in community support following weather disasters. The results showed strong agreement (84%) among respondents that libraries have a critical service role in disaster response. Most respondents expressed concern about the impact of weather-related hazards on their communities. During and after disasters, libraries continued to offer regular services, with Wi-Fi access and computer stations being the most commonly provided. While the Stafford Act designates libraries as essential services and allows for relocation funding through the Federal Emergency Management Agency, only 36% of respondents were aware of this legislation. To fully leverage available support, libraries must enhance their preparedness prior to such events. Slightly over half of respondents (51%) indicated their libraries had an emergency preparedness plan. Among those with plans, most had a traditional emergency response plan (82%), while fewer had a continuity of operations plan (13%), and only one library had a community resilience plan. These findings highlight significant opportunities for increased preparation. Wider adoption of continuity of operations plans and greater visibility of these services would enhance libraries' effectiveness as community resources during weather disasters."

Sustainable Librarianship: Core Competencies and Practices

Climate change and environmental destruction are a code red for humanity and are this generation's grandest challenge. In 2019, ALA Council added "Sustainability" as a core value of the profession, adopting the triple bottom line definition of sustainability to ensure balanced decision-making that respects environmental stewardship, social equity, and economic feasibility. As community leaders and facilitators, libraries should be modeling sustainable practices among their staff and within their facilities.



In this special eCourse, Rebekkah Smith Aldrich, President of the Sustainable Libraries Initiative, will lead you through the principles and practices of sustainable librarianship along with a group of expert speakers, lecturers, and writers.

After participating in this course:

- Students will have a strong understanding of the "triple bottom line" definition of sustainability as adopted by the American Library Association as a Core Value of Librarianship.
- Students will be able to accurately describe operational decisions, services, programs, and partnerships their library is already undertaking that better position their institutions as sustainability leaders
- Using the "sustainable thinking" model, students will be able to make operational decisions as well as design new services, programs, and partnerships to ensure their institutions are relevant and responsive in the face of the impacts of climate change.
- Students will understand the importance of equity, diversity, and inclusion in the context of climate justice.

This 4-week asynchronous eCourse will begin on Monday, March 10, 2025, and end on Sunday, April 6, 2025.

The Sustainable Libraries Initiative is putting out a call for idea sharing from our members!

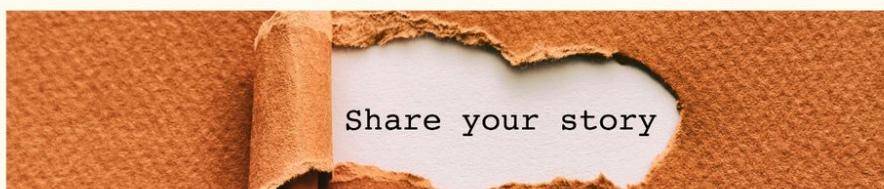
