



Policies = Framework

Energy & Waste Audits

The energy audit showed the impact of "green" systems. The waste audit revealed hidden areas of wasteful practice.

OUTDOOR SPACES



POLLINATOR GARDEN

Pollinator garden planted in October 2020. Listed as site on Pollinator Pathway for Charlotte, VT.



NATIVE PLANTS

Native plants garden installed in October 2020, built on permaculture practices and including pollinators and soil enriching plant varieties.



STORM DRAINS

Rain garden certified as a BLUE design and an Ahead of the Storm demonstration site.

TREES

Library garden space includes a dedicated rain garden with trees and shrubs.



RUNOFF

Four-barrel rain barrel system captures rain and snow runoff from library roof. Water is used in libraries gardens.

INDOOR SPACES



Daylight

All staff have access to workstations with outside views and daylight.





Climate Comfort

Windows open for circulation of fresh air in warmer months. HVAC system monitored for safe ventilation througout the year.








Solar Power


Solar panels on new town garage pay the energy bill, making the library net-zero building.

MATERIALS

reuse, repurpose, recycle



We started with paper and plastic and expanded to everything from batteries to toothpaste tubes.



STRETCHY PLASTIC

Newspaper sleeves, bread bags, grocery bags, product wrap, cereal liners, food storage & produce bags, ice bags, pellet bags, dry cleaning bags, case overwrap, salt bags, packing air pillows and all LDPE & HDPE films.

BATTERIES

Single-use batteries, such as AA, AAA, 9V or C or D cell, rechargeable and cellphone batteries.

E-WASTE

Electronics and accessories that are no bigger than a laptop.

CORKS

Natural corks from any bottled beverage. Bring to the desk.

CAN TOPPERS

4-pack holders for beer and other drinks.

ORAL CARE PRODUCTS & PACKAGING

toothpaste tubes, floss containers (no floss!), toothbrushes and all boxes or other packaging. Please make sure all materials are clean on the outside before dropping off.

SHAVING ACCESSORIES

All brands of disposable blades, razors, and plastic packaging.

RIGID #6 PLASTIC CUPS

Solo or other #6 plastic cups.




COLLECTIVE IMPACT

Partnered with the Clemmons Family Farm for a day of storytelling and mural making.





Following best-practice guidelines from the Vermont Department of Libraries, the Library Board Treasurer and Library Director review and manage funds each month.


